# Finding a home (group) in AA

Maybe it's the first meeting you ever attended, where someone greeted you warmly and made you feel at ease.

Maybe it's the meeting where you met your sponsor, where you can count on seeing each other every week.

Maybe it's the meeting that's

closest to home or the one with the best cookies, the strongest coffee, the most comfortable chairs.

Whatever the reason, you've landed there, and you plan to keep coming back. You've found your AA home group.

"I have a home group for the sense of community, commitment, and support it provides," said Lawry E, who calls Frostburg's Friday Night Serenity Group home. "We care that that particular group exists, we care that the other members are in our lives, and we support them, while they, in turn, care about us."

Just like most everything in Alcoholics Anonymous, finding a

home group is merely a suggestion. But many alcoholics in recovery find it so important that it's been called "the heartbeat of AA."

In the September 1986 Grapevine, RB of Neosho, Mo., wrote that "just as surely as we are aware of, sensitive to, and in need of our own heartbeat, each of us needs

a home group. It all began in the home group, didn't it?....It's where we first find a sponsor, where someone first sees that we get a Big Book, where we first see the Steps on the wall, where we learn again to pray, and where

we first begin to recover."

Carol C, whose home group is Cumberland's HOW group at 11 a.m. Tuesdays, said committing to a home group helps keep her accountable.

"First, I belong there," she said.
"The other members know I'll be
there, have gotten to know me, and
will often check in on me if I'm
absent. I know the other members,
as well, and so there is more of a

social connection than just going to a meeting and seeing other familiar faces. These people are my AA family, and I look forward to being with them every week."

Becoming a home group member is as simple as putting your name on a roster and showing up regularly. You might even get a service position – such as coffee maker, greeter,

secretary, treasurer, Intergroup rep, or General Service Representative (GSR).

The HOW group, which is restructuring after losing many active members due to age-related limitations, death, or relocation, hopes to have an

Intergroup rep and GSR by summer, Carol C said.

"Service positions are essential for keeping a group alive and vital to the AA community," she said.

Grayson S, who moved to Minnesota last year after graduating from Frostburg State University, had to search a bit before finding a favorite group in his new hometown.

"I had one early on up here, but my personal life made it difficult to commit to it," Grayson said. "I just found an awesome new home group that fits my schedule perfectly. And they had the need for a GSR, so I grabbed it! I love the group and their brand of AA sobriety."

Sheila C's home group is the Mustard Seed at Liberty Club in Oakland, which has a GSR and Intergroup rep. She recommends that newcomers commit to a home group early in sobriety.

"Finding a group where you feel comfortable

is how you find a home group," she said. "Identifying someone whose sharing you respond to is how you find a sponsor."

At Mustard Seed, home group members "know one another well, even if we don't know last names,"

Sheila said. "Sharing our experience, strength and hope, we heal together and nurture one another."

Frostburg's Friday Night Serenity group has become like family for Lawry E.

"Many members of my group are my closest friends," he said. "We communicate often and socialize outside of the rooms. These friends know what is going on in my life and care and support me when I am going through difficult situations. They teach and guide me through their words and actions, and hopefully, I am able to do the same for them."

# News from AA's General Service Office

### Literature prices to increase

Starting April 3, it will cost a little more to buy a Big Book and other AA literature. GSO is implementing an estimated 20 percent price increase for books; pamphlets will cost around 30 percent more. The last price increases took place in 2014.

## Meeting Guide app available

Alcoholics Anonymous GSO continues to improve its free app for iOS and Android smartphones to help people find AA meetings and resources. More than 100,000 weekly meetings are listed, including those in Western Maryland. The app is refreshed twice daily by GSO. The app also features a daily quote from the Daily Reflections, as well as the latest news from GSO and Grapevine.

### New 'jacketless' Big Book for sale

Recent and ongoing supply chain issues prompted the publishing department at GSO to explore finding ways to reduce production time on materials. Their solution: The jacketless Big Book, priced at \$9.50, soon to be followed by a jacketless *Twelve and Twelve*. For more information, go to onlineliterature.aa.org.

## AA Slogans: "Keep It Simple"

What Does It Mean to You?

When I first came into the program, three or four days sober, my mind was continuously racing. I was terrified that my entire life was going to come crashing down around me and I anticipated that I would lose everything. The phrase "Keep it Simple" helped me to slow down the runaway thoughts and just STOP.

Now that a number of 24 hours have passed, I can still go off the beam, with racing thoughts, when stressed out (mainly by family issues). By attempting to 'keep it simple' I can ease my anxious stress and evaluate exactly WHAT is getting me wrapped up in mental chaos. Usually it's ego as certain people aren't acting the way I



think that they should. By keeping it simple I am reminded to stay on my side of the sidewalk of life and, as John B. would remind me, let them all whirl. As a sober alcoholic, I can complicate the heck out of anything. "Keeping it Simple" allows me to break down my issues and determine exactly what parts of whatever 'it' is are my business. Typically, I find that when I break down an issue, much of it is none of my business.

Get a unified message to send to the groups to gather group information, such as contact information, etc.


Dan will create a group form for hotline to collect data. Kristin and Dan will collect and hand out information at the breakfast.
