About a dozen people mingled and chatted in small groups at November's event, while one-by-one participants took a turn on stage.

Sponsored by Western Maryland Intergroup, Open Mic Night first took place about a year ago to give area AAs an opportunity to socialize and have fun.

"People can do whatever they want," said Karen M., one of the organizers. "Somebody came and did magic tricks....It's whatever talent people want to share. We dance sometimes, too." Open mic nights take place from 6 to 8 p.m. on the last Saturday of each month at Fort Recovery, 418 N. Centre St., Cumberland. All are welcome. Coffee and refreshments are served.

Western Maryland Intergroup is responsible for the phone lines, the Where-n-When and newsletter publications, institutional 12thstep work, the website, the annual Gratitude Breakfast, and more, so that AA members and their families can hear the message of recovery. In all its activities, policies and proceedings, Intergroup observes the practice and spirit of AA's Twelve Traditions and Twelve concepts for World Service, as well as its three legacies of

Recovery, Unity and Service.

Western Maryland Intergroup carries the AA message through the following committees:

Cooperation with the Professional Community (CPC) — Works to establish better communication with professionals who work with alcoholics, explaining clearly what AA does and does not do.

Literature — Makes sure that AA literature is available to AA groups, service meetings, AA events, and the general public.

Corrections/Treatment (Institutions) — Works to carry the AA message of recovery to alcoholics who are incarcerated or in treatment settings.

Activities — Plans and coordinates activities for AA groups in the area, including picnics, bicycle rides, Open Mic Nights, and the annual Gratitude Breakfast.

Every AA group in the area is entitled to elect a representative to Intergroup. Intergroup representatives attend monthly meetings, contributing ideas and skills, and help to form the collective group conscience for AA in the area.



AA History

Why do we call it the "Big Book"?

"There was one last question to be discussed and argued before the presses began rolling: What would be the list price? They finally decided on \$3.50, rather high for 1939. To compensate for the price, they chose the thickest paper in Blackwell's plant. "The original volume proved to be so bulky that it became know as the 'Big Book,"" Bill recalled. "Of course the idea was to convince the alcoholic purchaser that he was indeed getting his money's worth!" The first printing was a half inch thicker than the current edition - although the latter has 14 more personal stories, plus other additional copy."
